- 1. Prayer and more prayer.

- 3. Information: Looking for information on the Internet and in your church community.
- 4. Reading scripture and church teaching.

## Three types of decisions:

- 1. Clear-cut decisions.
- 2. Clouded decisions.
- 3. Contrary decisions.

This is how Neil Armstrong made his decision.
